THE war department having announced the practical completion of the casualty lists of United States soldiers and marines during the period of America's participation in the great war, "The Tribune" this morning presents a tabulation of the names of Chicago boys who died in battle, who died of wounds sustained in a battle, and who died of other causes in our fighting service abroad.

The list is compiled from Gen. Pershing's official reports as published from day to day, beginning with Nov. 4, 1917, and continuing to date. Through a mistaken policy of the authorities at Washington, the addresses of the men in the casualty list were withheld for a short time at the outset. This error made it impossible to make the list full, but it is believed to be approximately complete.

The total casualties reported covering Chicago and immediate vicinity (of date March 29) are approximately:

Table with 2 columns: Category and Count. Categories include Killed in battle (860), Died of wounds (457), Died of other causes (511), Lost on transport (3), Wounded (5,243), Missing (416).

The total of those who at this time comprise the city's honor roll of known dead is 1,831.

When Chicago builds its Hero Memorial, in whatever form it takes, it is expected that the conspicuous feature—the roll of dead, of those who gave their lives to make our nation and the world safe from tyranny—will be essentially the list which is printed herewith.

In the following lists all names, except where otherwise designated, are of private soldiers. Marines are marked by a star (\*) before each name.

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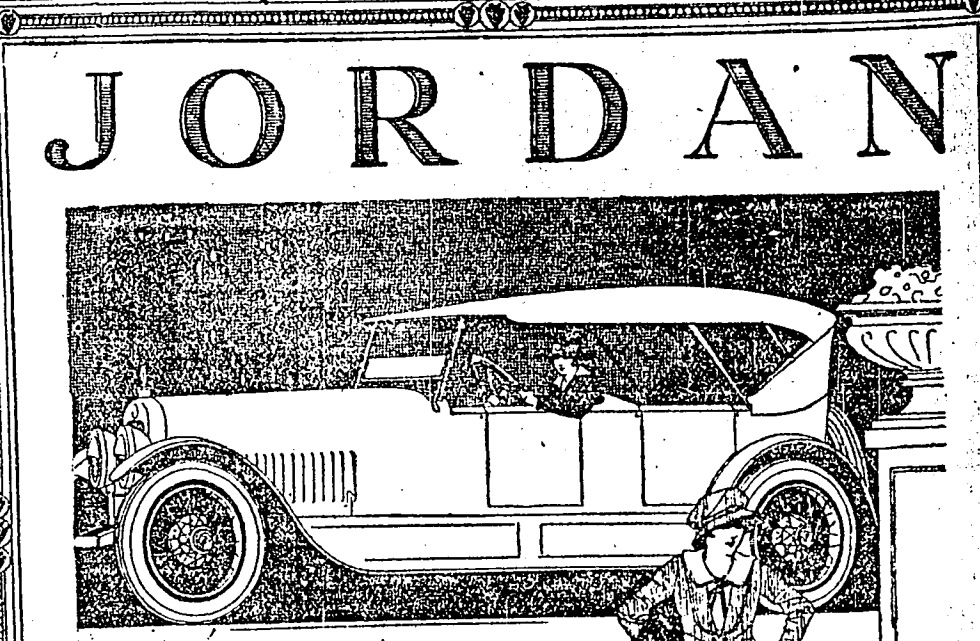
